Issues and challenges before SENDIASS involvement.

## **Parent concerns**

Ms B was concerned for her 11-year-old son's educational welfare, as two schools had refused to admit him citing that his admission would 'put other pupils learning at risk'. Ms B contended that this decision was unreasonable, as it was informed by details in a Statement that was written when her son was 5 and had not been updated since that time.

## **Parent support**

During a pre-meeting, between Ms B and a SENDIASS supporter, she was given the following advice:

- Request a meeting with a SEN team representative about the failure to update her son's statement.
- Clarification of the possible appeal options, should she need to appeal the school's decision to not offer her son a placement.

Following this meeting with SENDIASS Ms B was offered an opportunity to meet with the head of Camden's SEN team, which was also attended by a SENDIASS officer and a psychiatrist who had previously been supporting the family. In this meeting Ms B:

- Presented her arguments, with supporting documents, for her son to be placed in his first-choice school.
- Expressed her disappointment about the delay in updating her son's Statement, particularly as it was then used as evidence of his current needs for perspective schools







Specific actions and interventions provided by SENDIASS, include any strategies, support, or resources offered.

- The head of SEN Camden apologised for the mistakes made in not updating her son's Statement and proceeded to offer Ms B an immediate opportunity to amend the statement.
- He also informed Ms B that the amendments would immediately be passed on to the relevant planning and placement officer (PPO), for her son's Statement to be updated. Furthermore, Ms B was told to expect a phone call in approximately two days, at which time she would be informed of the outcome.
- The meeting ended with Ms B feeling satisfied that she had effectively represented her son's needs, expressing that she finally felt listened to.



## Improvements, significant changes, achievements.

- In light of the updated statement Ms B's son was given his first-choice school.
- Ms B felt much supported by SENDIASS and expressed the opinion that such a positive outcome might not have been achieved without SENDIASS support.
- Being able to access the service encouraged Ms B to actively participate in the parent/carer/steering groups.
